Boston Children's Faculty Parental Wellness Program

We are thrilled to announce the launch of the <u>Parental Wellness Program</u>, designed to <u>promote well-being</u>, <u>build community</u>, and <u>enhance productivity</u> among faculty. This program is sponsored by the Office of Faculty Development and Office for Women's Careers and supported by Boston Children's Health Affairs.

You will find a one-stop resource library, available to all, which offers a range of information aimed at ensuring your well-being and success as a parent and a professional. You will find information on navigating parental leave, lactation supports, the Boston Children's Childcare Center, backup childcare options, the Caregiver Travel Award, physician supports, wellness and more. We will be forming groups for faculty with children at every stage as well as for those with elder-care responsibilities.

Part of this initiative is the Pilot Lactation Program, led by Drs. Carly Guss and Kelly Wills Adani. This program is tailored to parent faculty who are currently pregnant or who are the lactating parent of an infant under six months of age. You do not need to be a first-time parent to participate. A stipend provides financial support up to \$500 to assist with the costs associated with feeding and lactation needs. Each participant will be paired with an experienced and trained Parental Wellness Advocate, who is also a colleague at Boston Children's, to provide guidance and support.

News from the BCH Archives

Infant's Hospital, or the Wolbach Building, circa 1920s. The Wolbach Building was formally the Infant's hospital from 1914 to 1923. In 1923, the building was sold to Harvard University and served as the Harvard School of Public Health until the 1976 when Boston Children's Hospital acquired it and

renamed in honor of William W. Wolbach, hospital president from 1959-1973. The building was torn down to accommodate the Hale Building; however, aspects of the original building were preserved including the outside columns, original front door, and a stained glass window located in what is now known as the Wolbach Atrium. Please join us on June 26th for a special Genomic Information Commons (GIC) Investigator Seminar at Boston Children's Hospital.

BCH leads the GIC, a multi institutional resource affording access to electronic health record data on millions of patients as well as prospectively enrolled broadly consented cohorts with genomic data and biospecimens. The GIC creates opportunities for investigators to conduct a range of genomics, biomarker, and epidemiological research.

Using GIC resources for your next project or grant submission gives you access to:

- Harmonized phenotype and genotype data, as well as data about biospecimens.
- A state-of-the art query portal to search real time across 6 pediatric research hospitals
- · Assistance finding collaborators at other research centers
- An established IRB protocol that all GIC sites rely on, eliminating the need to initiate a new IRB protocol to conduct research (for most use cases).
- A streamlined review process to provision datasets quickly.
- A secure analytics workspace to conduct your research on combined datasets with collaborators across sites.

HMS Catalyst Training Program: Career Catalyst

September 2024 - June 2025

Applications are due June 28, 2024 by 5:00pm EST.

Career Catalyst is a strategic, one-year mentoring program for early-career researchers. Participants in the program learn how to create a successful menteementor relationship, build a mentoring network, and grow their career.

In this program, mentees are placed in small groups of three to four participants and are matched with a senior faculty member who serves as a developmental mentor. Each mentee group meets together twice per month, once with their assigned senior mentor, and once as a peer group without their senior mentor.

To build a sense of community, three program-wide meetings for all mentees and mentors are hosted throughout the year (September, February, and June).
